Unbreakable (film)

Unbreakable is a 2000 American psychological superhero film written, produced, and directed by M. Night Shyamalan, and starring Bruce Willis, Samuel L

Unbreakable is a 2000 American psychological superhero film written, produced, and directed by M. Night Shyamalan, and starring Bruce Willis, Samuel L. Jackson, and Robin Wright. It is the first installment in the Unbreakable film series. In Unbreakable, David Dunn (Willis) survives a train crash with no injuries, leading to the realization that he harbors superhuman abilities. As he begins to grapple with this discovery, he comes to the attention of disabled comic book store owner Elijah Price (Jackson), who manipulates David to understand him.

Shyamalan organized the narrative of Unbreakable to parallel a comic book's traditional three-part story structure. After settling on the origin story, Shyamalan wrote the screenplay as a speculative screenplay with Willis already set to star in the film and Jackson in mind to portray Elijah Price. Filming began in April 2000 and was completed in July.

Unbreakable was released on November 22, 2000. It received generally positive reviews, with praise for Shyamalan's direction, screenplay, its aesthetics, the performances, the emotional weight of the story, cinematography, and the score by James Newton Howard. The film has subsequently gained a strong cult following. A realistic vision of the superhero genre, it is regarded by many as one of Shyamalan's best films and one of the best superhero films. In 2011, Time listed it as one of the top ten superhero films of all time, ranking it number four. Quentin Tarantino also included it on his list of the top 20 films released from 1992 to 2009.

After years of development on a follow-up film, a thematic sequel, Split, with Willis reprising his role as David Dunn in a cameo role, was released in January 2017. After the financial and critical success of Split, Shyamalan immediately began working on a third film, titled Glass, which was released January 18, 2019, thus making Unbreakable the first installment in the Unbreakable film series.

The film stars Zachary Levi as Scott LeRette, alongside Meghann Fahy, Jacob Laval, Drew Powell, Gavin Warren, and Patricia Heaton.

Lionsgate announced the project in November 2020, with Gunn attached as both writer and director. Principal photography began that same month in Oklahoma and concluded in December 2020. Originally

scheduled for release in 2022, the film was delayed multiple times before receiving a wide theatrical release in the United States on February 21, 2025.

The film received mixed reviews from critics, with praise directed at its inspirational tone and central performances, particularly Levi and Laval, though several reviewers criticized the autism representation and its overly sentimental and formulaic approach. At the box office, *The Unbreakable Boy* earned \$6.4 million in the United States and Canada and \$1.1 million internationally, for a worldwide total of \$7.5 million.

Glass is a 2019 American superhero thriller film written and directed by M. Night Shyamalan. It is a crossover and sequel to Shyamalan's previous films *Unbreakable* (2000) and *Split* (2016) and the third and final installment in the *Unbreakable* trilogy. Bruce Willis, Samuel L. Jackson, Spencer Treat Clark, and Charlayne Woodard reprise their *Unbreakable* roles, while James McAvoy and Anya Taylor-Joy return as their *Split* characters, with Sarah Paulson, Adam David Thompson, and Luke Kirby joining the cast. The film sees David Dunn / the Overseer as he and Kevin Wendell Crumb / the Horde are captured and placed in a psychiatric facility with Elijah Price / Mr. Glass, where they contemplate the authenticity of their superhuman powers.

After the Walt Disney Studios' Touchstone Pictures opted not to finance a sequel to *Unbreakable*, Shyamalan set out to write *Split* using a character he had written for *Unbreakable* but pulled from its script. He decided to create a trilogy of works, using the ending of *Split* to merge *Glass* with the *Unbreakable* narrative. To secure the rights to use Willis' and Jackson's *Unbreakable* characters, Shyamalan promised to include Disney in the film along with Universal Pictures. *Split* was a financial and critical success, and by April 2017 Shyamalan announced that he started the production process for *Glass*.

Glass had its world premiere in select Alamo Drafthouse Cinema theaters on January 12, 2019, and was released in the United States on January 18 by Universal Pictures. The film received mixed reviews from critics, who found the film "disappointing" and "underwhelming" due to the story, particularly the third act, but praised the performances of the cast; many deemed it the weakest in the trilogy. The film was a financial success, grossing \$247 million worldwide against a \$20 million production budget.

The series follows 29-year-old Kimmy Schmidt (Kemper) as she adjusts to life after being rescued from a doomsday cult in the fictional town of Durnsville, Indiana, where she and three other women were held captive by Reverend Richard Wayne Gary Wayne (Jon Hamm) for 15 years. Determined to be seen as something other than a victim and armed only with a positive attitude, she decides to restart her life by moving to New York City, where she quickly befriends her street-wise landlady Lillian Kaushtupper (Carol Kane), finds a roommate in struggling actor Titus Andromedon (Tituss Burgess), and gains a job as a nanny for melancholic and out-of-touch socialite Jacqueline Voorhees (Jane Krakowski).

Throughout its run, the series received critical acclaim, with critic Scott Meslow calling it "the first great sitcom of the streaming era". It received 20 Primetime Emmy Award nominations, including four

nominations for Outstanding Comedy Series and a nomination for Outstanding Television Movie for the 2020 special *Kimmy vs. the Reverend*.

Split (2016 American film)

The film follows a man with dissociative identity disorder who kidnaps and imprisons three teenage girls in an isolated underground facility.

Principal photography began on November 11, 2015, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. The film premiered at Fantastic Fest on September 26, 2016, and was released in the United States on January 20, 2017. It was the first film by Shyamalan to be distributed by Universal Pictures instead of Touchstone Pictures, which went defunct in 2016. It received generally positive reviews; critics highly praised McAvoy's performance, and welcomed Shyamalan's direction, although some mental health advocates criticized the film for its stigmatization of mental illness. Split was a commercial success, grossing \$278 million worldwide on a budget of \$9 million, becoming Blumhouse Productions' highest-grossing film until 2023 when *Five Nights at Freddy's* overtook it. The 2019 film *Glass*, which combined the casts and characters of both previous films, concluded the trilogy.

The Unbreakable trilogy, also known as the Eastrail 177 Trilogy, is an American superhero thriller and psychological horror film series. The trilogy consists of *Unbreakable* (2000), *Split* (2016), and *Glass* (2019), which were all written, produced, and directed by M. Night Shyamalan.

The franchise features the character David Dunn, a man who discovers he has the abilities of a superhero. The series has been noted for its differences from more traditional superhero films, with Shyamalan's work referred to as "the first auteur shared superhero universe". It is the first superhero franchise that is written and directed by one person, in comparison to other popular films in the genre. Shyamalan has noted that while it is based on comic book superheroes, and refers to comic books, it is not actually derived from comic book material itself. In contrast to most superhero films, the series is also generally grounded in reality, and is seen as a deconstruction of the superhero genre. The series is thus considered to be a unique take on the superhero genre.

The filmmaker has stated that the films are origin stories of people with unique gifts, with the intent being to acknowledge that every person has something special about them. *Unbreakable* has been labeled the first grounded superhero film, while *Split* has been called the first solo supervillain origin story, and Hollywood's first stealth sequel.

Madison Elle Beer (born March 5, 1999) is an American singer and songwriter. Beer first gained substantial media coverage when Justin Bieber posted a link to one of her covers she posted on YouTube. In 2013, she released her debut single "Melodies". In 2018, she released her debut extended play (EP), *As She Pleases*,

which produced the singles "Dead" and "Home with You".

Beer signed with Epic Records in 2019. She released her debut studio album, *Life Support*, in 2021. The album was supported by several singles, including "Selfish", which earned a RIAA Platinum certification. Her second studio album, *Silence Between Songs*, was released in 2023. It received a nomination for Best Immersive Audio Album at the 66th Annual Grammy Awards. In 2024, Beer released "Make You Mine," for which she received a nomination for Best Dance Pop Recording at the 67th Annual Grammy Awards.

Aside from her solo work, Beer has voiced the virtual character Evelyn in the *League of Legends* virtual band K/DA, with whom she has released the singles "Pop/Stars" (2018) and "More" (2020). She has also appeared on television series such as *Todrick* (2015) and *RuPaul's Drag Race* (2020), and in the film *Louder Than Words* (2013).

It was preceded by *Stardust Crusaders* and followed by *Golden Wind*.
